## Grammar Challenge

This is not mandatory! You may choose to complete this assignment for a challenge.

The challenge sentence is from the *Eighth Grade Binder!* 

To the best of your ability, analyze and diagram this sentence:

When I came to our corner, the shower was over, and there was a great watery <u>sunset</u> right over the home at the end of the street.

("sunset" is the subject of this clause; "there" is merely introductory. It is not an adverb of place of the verb "was", nor is it the subject. Because of this, it is not placed in the sentence diagram, but above it. I will show you an example from a dictation we had earlier this year:

I a [(Through the years) there were three women [who had lit the fires and sorubbed the floors (in welcome).]

This is a complex declarative sentence.

See how "there" floats above the sentence? The subject "women" and the verb "were" are diagrammed as normal.
